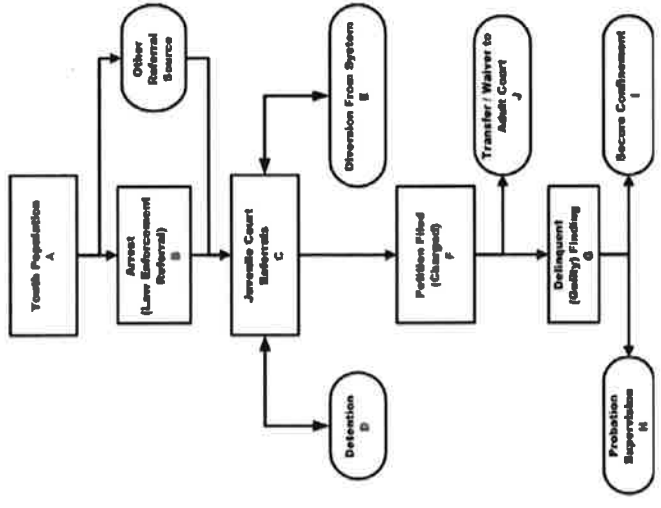

Juvenile Justice Points of Contact



Phase 1

- The Burns Institute assisted with data collection to help identify the demographic distribution of our youth population most in need of services and ethnic and racial disparity within the juvenile justice process.
- The Burns Institute assisted in forming a R.E.D. Collaborative group.
 - This is a group of people that includes County employees and members of the public who provide feedback and input about services that can benefit Mono County's youth.
- In Phase 1 Probation implemented a valid and reliable risk assessment for detention entry.



Dr. Rita Cameron-Wedding

Dr. Cameron-Wedding is a professor of Ethnic Studies at Sacramento State University. She is a national and international trainer on implicit bias.

Implicit Bias Training

In Phase 2, Dr. Rita Cameron-Wedding visited Mono County on two different occasions and provided implicit bias training to county staff and community members.

Phase 3

- After identifying a target population, the collaborative decided to partner with Behavioral Health and expand an already existing program, Club House Live.
- On January 18, 2017, the Phase 3 grant application was approved.
- The R.E.D collaborative is using funds previously allocated for the Burns Institute to invest in the Club House Live Program. These funds will be used to expand the program to fit the needs of the diversion group as well as all youth in our community.
