





Public Health



In October and November, fifty-six Crowley property owners of multi-unit housing (MUH) received an educational letter and survey to ascertain the level of support for a smoke-free policy. The question was, **"Would you support a county ordinance that creates smoke free areas within multiunit housing units, on patios and balconies, 20 feet from doorways of multiunit housing, and in common areas of multi-unit housing (pools, jacuzzis, picnic areas)?"** Sixty-one percent of all property owners/managers completed surveys. There is strong support for a county-wide smoke-free MUH policy among property owners in Crowley. Of the 34 respondents, 24 (68%) strongly supported or supported a smoke-free policy. Ten respondents (30%) opposed or strongly opposed a county-wide policy. Two supporters reiterated their support and gratitude in additional comments. Of two opposed commentators, one expressed concern for the rights of smokers, and one thought that smoking policy should be left up to property owners. One more supporter expressed the need for effective enforcement that held smokers, not property owners or managers, accountable for violations.

Social Services

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Social services staff assisted Pastor Mike from The Church on the Mountain (located in Crowley Lake) with locating families in need of holiday assistance in the form of Holiday Food Bags. With the help of several staff members from Social Services, we were able to distribute 30 bags of food which included either a turkey or a ham to families in need for the Holidays!

In the Chalfant/Benton region, we thank Rick Williams for his time to ensure that this special holiday food donation made it to low-income senior citizens in more remote areas of the county. He met Pastor Mike at the Meat House in Bishop on the Friday morning before Christmas to load up his truck and individually make each delivery.

In addition to the generosity of Church on the Mountain, other faith- based and service organizations reached out to Social Services this year to offer support to Mono County residents in need. The long tradition of the Angel Giving Tree, overseen by Public Health Nurse, Carolyn Balliet, once again resulted in Christmas gifts for many youth throughout the county.



The Child Welfare office was filled with gifts and goodies for social workers to deliver to many appreciative families. The Girl Scouts offered to put gifts together for senior citizens in the Benton and Chalfant regions.

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And lastly, we are excited to share a new partnership with the Lighthouse Church. For many years, Lighthouse has provided support to families involved with Social Services in unique ways. They are often able to fill needs in ways that the Department cannot always do.



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In December, the Lighthouse shared that they have formalized this service by allocating a dedicated monthly budget for the sole purpose of helping our most vulnerable community members who come into contact with Social Services. Their intent is to provide year-round support.

Psychological First Aid Training

Mono County recently received a visit from the American Red Cross L.A. Chapter for a variety of trainings in our local area. In December, 20 individuals from Inyo and Mono Counties participated in a training called Psychological First Aid Training in which they learned about typical stress reactions and when to refer people to a mental health professional among

other topics.

Also in December, 18 individuals participated in a CPR/First Aid class located at the Mammoth Lakes Fire Department in which they were able to refresh their skills or begin learning CPR and first aid.

Point-in-Time Count of homeless

The Eastern Sierra Continuum of Care (CoC), a coalition of providers of homeless prevention services, along with many partner agencies, will conduct its annual Point-in-Time Count of homeless individuals and families on Thursday, January 25, 2018.


During the early evening hours, staff and volunteers will visit campgrounds, parking lots and other places in the Eastern Sierra to find and survey people living outside. Non-profit and faith based service providers will also count the number of people that are temporarily residing in emergency shelter because they are without a home.

The surveys are completely anonymous and confidential, and the information is collected for evaluation by the CoC and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Information from the surveys will shed light on the extent and nature of homelessness in Inyo, Mono, and Alpine counties. The data will also be used to plan and implement housing solutions to homelessness in our rural area.



The Homeless Count is a HUD requirement for the local CoC funding process, which brings over \$300 million in federal funding to California each year to serve people experiencing homelessness. This funding provides permanent supportive housing, rapid rehousing, temporary shelter and supportive services to assist homeless persons.
